- Mayor Procuk received the City of Cleveland Water Departments annual report and put copies in Council mail.
- A letter was received from The CEO and President of Metro Health informing the public that they
 are acquiring the doctors from Health Span and will be accepting their patients.
- Received a letter from Health Span that the Call Center in Brooklyn Heights will close on March 31, 2016 and the buildings will be for sale. Approximately 200 employees will be permanently laid-off. They are currently in negotiations for the sale of the property and buildings.

Quad City CERT Executive Director Steve Peine explained that CERT – Community Emergency Response Team – is active in Brooklyn Heights, Seven Hills, Independence and Valley View and he is promoting participation in the group.

POLICE CHIEF

- MOTION: Mr. Foote moved to pay North Royalton \$1,750 for housing of seven prisoners for a total of 24 days. Second by Mr. Walsh Motion carried 5-0
- Chief Algeri, Mayor Procuk and Mr. Dowling have been in talks with the Cuyahoga Valley Regional Council of Governments to explore the regional jail in Cuyahoga Heights to save money.
- MOTION: Mr. Black moved to pay Protech Security Sales \$2,520 to replace four bulletproof vests at a cost of \$610 each plus shipping. Second by Mr. Lasky Motion carried 5-0 We will be reimbursed \$1,260 through the Bullet-proof Vest Partnership.
- Chief Algeri attended the Cuyahoga County OVI Reductions Task Force luncheon. Ptl. Dave Jablonski was recognized for Seat Belt Enforcement (65 citations issued), Ptl. Joe Coyne and Ptl. Cody Alflen for OVI arrests at 4 each.
- The village has been reimbursed for the light pole at Tuxedo and Granger in the amount of \$10,438.65. The pole was damaged in a traffic accident last fall and her insurance paid.
- The MDT (computer) from Columbus work and are installed in the vehicles. Officer Jablonski donated a laptop to the department for the officers to write their reports and check their email.
- Officer John Kruchek was sworn in as a new part-time officer bringing our department to five part-time and twelve full-time members.

Mr. Walsh said he saw a permanent electronic speed sign in Cuyahoga Heights, thought it would work on Schaaf Road and wondered what the cost would be. Chief Algeri replied that the cost is approximately \$3,000 and he would love to have one on Schaaf Road.

Mr. Lahiff asked why we couldn't put the portable one on Schaaf Rd. permanently and Chief Algeri said that people like to see it moved around to the different areas.

Mayor Procuk said that after the budget is set on March 31st he can put this in the Safety Committee to be discussed.

FIRE CHIEF

Chief Stefanko told council he is not asking for any money but the department has applied for two state grants and one federal grant. The state grants would be for radio equipment and a \$30,000 grant for turn-out gear. We are in need of ten sets of turn-out gear. The federal grant is for \$30,000 and would be for new hose and accessories. We will also be applying for the State of Ohio EMS grant.

Chief Stefanko congratulated Steve Peine on his acceptance as Executive Director of CERT and told him the department would work with him to increase membership and help with their fundraising efforts.

Chief Stefanko told council that we would no longer contract with Cleveland State University for continuing education credits, but instead would be working through University Hospital using their software program saving the village about \$600.

He has attended several RNC Preparedness meetings and said the department would continue our mutual aid with Independence and the surrounding communities during the convention helping out in Cleveland as a last resort.

Captain Calvillo is on a six-month leave of absence as he is the interim chief of Cleveland Fire. He is going through the interview process to become the permanent chief which will leave our department in need of an officer. FF Prebish has been hired full-time in Parma so he is on a one-year leave of absence and the same may happen with FF Goldsworth in June. We will need to hire a few more personnel.

COMMUNITY SERVICES

MOTION: Mr. Black moved to provide a bus to Cuyahoga Heights After-Prom for the trip to Kalahari on prom night and to Cedar Point a week later. Second by Mr. Walsh Motion carried 5-0

MOTION: Mr. Lahiff moved to pay Cuyahoga County \$1,580 for the website upgrade. Second by Mr. Walsh Motion carried 5-0

This upgrade will make the site more user friendly for tablets and cell phones and enhance the searching ability of Google.

Mrs. Guilfoyle thanked FF Dan McNeilly for donating his time to do CPR, AED and First Aid training for her department.

Mindy Armbrust will offer a one-day Art-In-The-Park session during Spring Break.

ENGINEER

Mr. Henry asked for a motion to pay Cuyahoga County Department of Public Works \$1,565.42 for the analysis of the bridge.

MOTION: Mr. Walsh moved to pay Cuyahoga County Department of Public Works invoice of \$1,565.42 for the bridge analysis. Second by Mr. Foote Motion carried 5-0

Mr. Henry said we were awarded \$51,750 by the Cuyahoga County Department of Public Works for road materials to fix Tuxedo, Schaaf, Van Epps and Spring roads.

The South Street water main low bid contractor has withdrawn his bid. The second low bid contractor will hold their cost. The village will be responsible for \$75,000 of a \$320,000 project with the balance to be paid by the Cleveland Water Department. The new contractor would be Terrace Construction.

Mr. Clymer reported that the General Fund is up year-to-date \$57,905.82. Through 3 of 25 RITA distributions we are up 17% or about \$109,000 over last year.

Mr. Clymer will send out the budget draft to the department heads.

The audit will be the beginning of March.

Mr. Clymer would like Mrs. Guilfoyle and himself appointed to the Firefighters Dependent Board and the Fire Department has to appoint two members.

ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT

Mayor Procuk reported:

- Greg Geis is no longer looking at a spec building but is courting a potential prospect.
- Mayor Procuk drove the village and took pictures of the businesses with broker signs in front of them. He said there are eight building owners that have space
- The largest unoccupied building in Brooklyn Hts. is the Fed Ex building. Next is the second Safeguard building and the WACO building.
- Nino is working on collecting the sign fees of the properties with signage.
- We are working on collecting taxes on the businesses that owe.

MAYOR'S REPORT

Mayor Procuk reported that the RNC is still looking for volunteers. These volunteers would work outside the Q directing people, acting as ambassadors, at hotels etc.

Mayor Procuk would like to seat the Charter Review Commission at the March 1, 2016 meeting. Each council member, the Mayor and the Clerk/Treasurer may appoint one member for a total of seven members.

Mark Lasky was a member of both the Planning Commission and the Zoning Board of Appeals but as councilman he will resign his seat. Steve Peine will remain on the Planning Commission and Maria Tritsarolis has expressed a desire to serve on both committees. Mayor and council will make the decision on March 1st.

Mayor Procuk told the Western Reserve Kennel Club that we will honor their contract to use the Community Center through the end of the year and then revisit it in January. The Community Center was rented by their member John Tacejko who has since passed away.

Mayor Procuk is the president of the Mayors and Managers Association.

The dues to the Southwest Council of Governments for the HazMat Team will increase \$5000 over the next 4 years.

There will be a Parks & Playground Committee meeting on February 9th at 6:30 to discuss the splash pool/splash park in Cuyahoga Heights.

Mayor Procuk said that Mayor Bacci is going to ask his council to put a .5% tax increase on the ballot.

BUILDING COMMITTEE

Mr. Foote said they met to discuss both residential and commercial building fees and they will be adopting a new fee schedule.

No action will be taken at this time on the Zoning fees, Sewer connection fees or the Street opening fees.

COMMUNITY GARDEN MEETING

Mr. Foote said about twelve people came to the meeting. They might look at the front of the Pretzer property on Schaaf Road, the tennis courts or the Dorset Mini Park. They are trying to form a committee. They are not expecting a garden in this calendar year.

SERVICE DIRECTOR

Mr. Hatgas reported that we have applied for a Recycling Grant in the amount of \$3,184.29. We have been awarded an ODNR Grant in the amount of \$3,375 to replace tree lawn trees.

Mr. Hatgas told council that the boiler in the municipal center is over 45 years old and will need to be replaced. He is soliciting bids.







Hi Mayor. Here are some talking points for the Council meeting. This is as much information as we can provide at this moment. Our HR department forwarded me the letter you should have received a couple weeks ago and is attached to this email, although I do not have access to the attachments. If you did not receive it, I will have them forward it to you again. I will update you with any additional information as I receive it. Please call me if you have any questions, need anything further or if I can be helpful.

- HealthSpan owns four buildings in Brooklyn Heights that hold key operations including our Clinical Call Center, Member Service Center, Advice Nursing, a data center, pharmacy operations and other administrative offices.
- The complex holds about 200 employees, filling nearly all of the space in the complex.
- As we have previously announced, HealthSpan will exit care delivery March 31 and transition our patients and plan members to network partners including The MetroHealth System, Summa Physicians and Mercy Health in Lorain.
- We are in negotiations to sell our facilities throughout northeast Ohio to network partners.
- We expect the buildings in Brooklyn Heights to be sold to a network partner and remain occupied after March 31. Employees in the Member Service Center and Advice Nursing are among those who will continue to work in the complex after March 31 while leasing the space from a new owner.

- We are unable to predict exactly how many employees will be working in the complex after March 31.
- We will communicate soon with stakeholders in all of our communities regarding any changes at these facilities.
