

SENIOR SNOW REMOVAL

Seniors, age 65+ and, disabled residents (with proof from a medical doctor) can apply. Cost is \$125 for the season, unless approved for HEAP for the 2016-17 year. HEAP-approved applicants will pay \$50. The HEAP discount will be applied after your acceptance letter is received by our office. The application and outline is attached. Applications can be dropped off the at the Community Services office.

HEAP ENERGY ASSISTANCE

Applications are available for the State of Ohio HEAP Energy Assistance program which provides a one-time benefit to

your main heating source. It also qualifies you for a discount on village senior snow removal and grass cutting programs. You must apply every year and applications are available in our office. Income eligibility levels are: 1-person, \$20,790; 2-person, \$28,035; etc.

REMEMBRANCE CELEBRATION

The holiday season can be difficult for anyone who has lost a loved one - whether recently or long ago. A short, non-denominational service will be held to commemorate and celebrate the lives of your special loved ones on Wednesday, November 30th. MEMORY SCREENINGS, NOVEMBER 15TH

Residents can take advantage of free, confidential screenings at the Community Center at the bi-monthly senior social. National Memory Screening, an annual initiative of the Alzheimer's Foundation of America is designed to promote proper detection of memory problems and strategies for successful aging. The screenings will be held at the Senior Social, 12:30 - 1:30 p.m. The event features a face-to-face screening, which takes only about five minutes, and consists of a series of questions and tasks. It is administered by our social worker and is completely confidential. The results do not represent a diagnosis, and AFA advises those individuals with below-normal scores to follow up with a qualified healthcare professional. You must pre-register by calling 739-3702.

How Medicare Advantage Plans compare with Original Medicare

As we are in the season for open enrollment, many seniors are trying to decide what path to take with their Medicare coverage. The two primary choices are between remaining with Original (traditional), Medicare or joining a Medicare Advantage plan that offers HMOs (Health Maintenance Organizations) type coverage.

Following are some of the key differences between the two options:

- 1. **Providers you can use.** HMOs will usually only cover your care from doctors and hospitals in their network, except in the case of emergency or urgent care. They may also offer out of network coverage under a different benefit structure. Original Medicare will cover your care from most doctors and hospitals in the country. HMOs usually require that you receive a referral from your primary care physician before you can get care from a specialist, while in Original Medicare you do not need to get a referral.
- 2. **Benefits.** HMOs must offer all the benefits available under Original Medicare (Part A and Part B). Some HMOs may offer additional benefits that Original Medicare does not cover, such as dental care or eye care. Many Medicare HMOs also offer Medicare prescription drug coverage (Part D). If you are in a Medicare HMO, and you want Medicare drug coverage, you must get your drug coverage from that same plan. Services such as dental and eye care, as well as drugs are not included in Original Medicare.
- 3. **Premium.** In Original Medicare, you pay only the Part B premium. HMOs may charge a monthly premium in addition to the Medicare Part B premium. The premium may be higher if the HMO offers prescription drug coverage (Part D) benefits. When you are in an HMO you must continue to pay the Part B premium.
- 4. **Out-of-pocket costs.** With Original Medicare you generally pay 20 percent coinsurance for doctors' and other medical services. Supplemental insurance such as a Medigap* or a retiree plan could help pay for that coinsurance. In an HMO, you usually pay a fixed amount for services (copayment). HMO copays cannot be higher than Original Medicare for some services, like chemotherapy, dialysis and durable medical equipment, but could be higher for other services, such as home health and hospital. Also, unlike Original Medicare, HMOs must have a cap on out-of-pocket costs to protect you against very high costs if you receive expensive care. The maximum out-of-pocket, in network, cost allowed for HMOs in 2017 is \$6,700.
- 5. **Affordability.** If you are generally healthy and only see doctors and other providers in the HMO's network, your out-of -pocket costs may be lower than in Original Medicare. If you use doctors and hospitals that are not in the HMOs network, or you see many providers, your costs could be higher. Since HMOs include a limit on out-of-pocket costs, you are protected from very high costs if you need a lot of medical care or expensive treatments.
- 6. **Medications.** Drug plans are bundled with the Advantage Plan. You may be able to find cheaper drug out-of-pocket costs, but you must switch your entire Advantage Plan to get these lower drug costs. With Original Medicare, you need to purchase a separate Medicare Part D drug plan, with its own premium.

Each option for health care coverage has its unique features. If you need further information or help in the decision making process, please contact the Village to ask to speak with the social worker. One word of caution: If you are currently on a health care plan and are considering changing, do not terminate your current coverage until you have confirmation that you have been accepted by the new plan!

*Note: Many people who have Original Medicare also purchase a Medigap plan to help pay some of their costs (such as deductibles and copays). Medigap plans are supplemental insurance policies that work specifically with Original Medicare. You cannot have a Medigap and a Medicare HMO together.





THE BREEZE

WINTER DRIVING TIPS

Winter driving can present troublesome challenges for even the most diligent of drivers. Snow and ice make driving more difficult and sometimes even dangerous.

When driving in the snow, do everything slowly & gently. Remember, in the snow, tires just barely grab the road. Accelerate slowly & gently, turn slowly & gently & brake slowly & gently.

Slippery Roads are the biggest hazard of winter driving - caused by ice, slushy snow or rain. Roads are especially slick following the first rain after a dry spell since oil & grease have built up on the roads. Remember the distance it takes to bring your car to a stop on dry pavement. In winter conditions, allow at least 3 times that distance to reach a full stop & avoid skidding. Reduce the danger of skidding by driving more slowly & by pumping the brakes as you slow down for a turn rather than holding them down. Test your brakes frequently & never tailgate. If in spite of your precautions you find yourself beginning to skid, DO NOT BRAKE. Instead, take your foot off the accelerator & gently turn your car in the direction you want your front wheels to go. Hitting the brakes or turning sharply will only lock you into a skid. If you can't get control of your car, it is better to steer into a snow bank or fence than to risk a collision in traffic.

<u>Visibility</u> is another hazard of winter driving. In heavy snow, keep your lights on. If you get stuck in snow, avoid spinning your wheels - you'll only dig in deeper. Instead, shovel snow away from the wheel pads & pour salt, sand or cinders around the drive wheels to improve traction.

KEY SAFETY TIP:

- Allow extra time & space on the road.
- Listen to the weather forecast.
- Make sure the tires have adequate tread. All –weather radials are usually adequate for most winter conditions.

WINTER CAR KIT:

- Keep these items in your car:
- Flashlights with extra batteries.
- First aid kit with pocket knife.
- Necessary medications.
- Several blankets
- Sleeping bags
- Extra newspapers for insulation
- Matches
- Extra set of mittens, socks & a wool cap
- Snow gear & extra clothes
- Small sack of sand for generating traction under wheels.
- Small shovel
- Booster cables
- Set of tire chains or traction mats
- Brightly colored cloth to use as a flag
- Bottled water.

Autumn is a busy and beautiful time of year, but it can also be hazardous. Carbon monoxide isn't the only danger associated with autumn, which is also a peak period for fires and some types of injuries. Now is the time to start getting your heating appliances ready for the cooler weather. To simplify home safety measures this season, use these fall safety tips:

- **1**. *GET A SENSOR*: During cold weather, your furnace will be running and your windows will be closed, so you should install a carbon monoxide detector near your home's bedrooms.
- **2. SERVICE YOUR FURNACE:** Before the heating season, a qualified heating technician should service your furnace to ensure that it will operate safely and efficiently.
- **3.** CHECK THE CHIMNEY: Inspect your chimney to make sure it is unobstructed. Because many furnaces vent into the chimney, it must be free of debris to allow products of combustion to vent to the outside atmosphere. If you will be burning wood in a fireplace, have the chimney inspected to make sure it is in good condition and free of creosote buildup.
- **4.** CLEAR THE AREA: Make sure the area around your furnace is clear for good air circulation. Keep all flammable materials, such as clothing, cardboard boxes, paint thinners, fuels and solvents, far away from the furnace.
- **5. NEVER HEAT WITH AN OVEN:** On chilly autumn mornings, avoid the temptation to warm the kitchen with a gas range or an open oven door. The unvented products of combustion can quickly build to toxic levels.
- **6. WATCH SPACE HEATERS:** Be cautious with portable heaters or space heaters, making sure to follow manufacturer instructions for safe venting and use. Place them at least three feet away from any combustibles, such as wallpaper, bedding, draperies, clothing and furniture. Never leave them operating when you are away from the room or asleep. Don't leave children or pets unattended with space heaters, and never use them to dry clothing, shoes or mittens.
- **7.** *LOOK UP*: Avoid overhead power lines. Before you work, look up from your work area to inspect for overhead power lines. Then make sure to stay clear of electrical lines when working with ladders, pruning trees, etc.
- **8. DIAL BEFORE DIGGING:** Anytime you plan to dig, whether as part of a construction job or homeowner project (such as putting up a fence or basketball hoop, planting trees or shrubs, building a home addition, deck, etc.) please call your local utilities company.
- **9. LIGHT FOR SAFETY:** As days grow short, make sure outdoor lighting is in good working order. Good lighting can protect you against crime and falls or accidents caused by darkness. Inspect fixtures and outlets for weather damage and replace burned-out bulbs.
- **10.** CHECK YOUR SMOKE DETECTORS: Make sure you have a working smoke detector by changing the batteries when you change the time. A working smoke detector increases your chances of escaping a fire in your home by over 50 percent.
- **11.** *PLAN AN ESCAPE*: Plan and review escape routes. Have at least two ways to get out of every room. Agree on a meeting place outside where everyone can gather after they escape. Practice your escape.



Dear Village Residents,

Forgetting to turn your clock BACK on Sunday, November 6, 2016 could cost you some valuable time; forgetting to change the smoke detector's battery could cost you your life! The Brooklyn Heights Fire Department reminds you to change your smoke detector batteries as you reset your clocks from daylight savings time. The time changes in the fall and spring coincide with recommended battery life in a smoke detector. Smoke detectors are present in 92% of American homes, but nearly one-third don't work because of worn or missing batteries. As part of our ongoing effort to make certain that every village household has a working smoke detector, the fire department will accept any resident's request to have their smoke detector batteries replaced. More importantly, if you do not have a working smoke detector or if it is ten years old or older, please buy one and we will install it for you. If you would like to participate in this program, please fill out the form below and drop it in the payment box located to the left of the main entrance of our municipal building (345 Tuxedo Ave.).
