VILLAGE FOOD PANTRY OPEN TO ALL QUALIFYING RESIDENTS

The Village Food Pantry is available for all eligible households. Annual income eligibility requirements are \$22,339 for a one-person household; \$30,259 for a two-person household; \$38,179 for a three-person household. Add \$7,920 for each additional household member. The Pantry contains fresh poultry, meat,

dairy items, canned goods, paper products, and personal hygiene items. Availability of items varies. Pantry visits are by appointment only during normal business hours. Shut-in residents may call and request delivery.

You, the Caregiver, But So Much More

What is in a name? In the past, those who assumed the role of caring for others were referred to as "Caretakers." This same group of individuals, in more recent times, is generally referred to as "Caregivers." It is much more than just a term, it is what it signifies. The term "caregiver' is synonymous with one who extends themselves to others, in the role of giving care. And that is precisely who you are...a caregiver.

As a caregiver, you may be accustomed to hearing people describe you with words such as selfless, loving, devoted and maybe even, "a saint." Yet, how often do you look at yourself in the role of caregiver and decide these qualities could not be further from the truth?

Certainly it is true that caregivers often possess many admirable qualities. However, the reality of the day to day role of caring for another person, one who may be totally dependent upon you, may find you describing yourself more often with terms such as guilty, filled with resentment, angry, and lonely.

Let's explore some of these qualities. Why would a caregiver see themselves as guilty? Simply because you are unable to perform all the "would haves, could haves and should haves" that your role demands. Humanly unable to meet all these expectations, you then assume the mantra of guilt. You must learn to accept the gap between perfection and realty, what you should do and what you realistically could go.

Do you ever feel resentful? If you see yourself as abandoned, having the full responsibility fall upon you, or not appreciated for the work you do, resentment is likely to follow. Perhaps one of the best ways to deal with resentful is to vent. You may find this outlet in a trusted friend, family member, professional or even a caregiver support group. The important thing is to find somewhere or someone so you can release the feelings before you explode.

It is difficult to find a caregiver who has never experienced the emotion of anger. So often the role of caregiver requires you to give up yourself for another. When personal needs are consistently placed second, anger is a common response. The best way to deal with it is to acknowledge the anger and focus your efforts on trying to minimize the situation. For instance is there a compromise where someone else may periodically assume some of the responsibility, freeing you up for yourself?

Lastly, loneliness is frequently synonymous with being a caregiver. To maintain outside relationships takes time; and time is a commodity that generally is fleeting for caregivers. As demands on your time grow, social interaction tends to diminish, resulting in a loss of social support. To survive, you must make a conscious effort to reach out to others either in person, on the phone, or online. Do whatever works best, just make sure that you do something.

The overall message is that to be the very best caregiver possible, you MUST also care for yourself. Without a doubt this may be difficult, but you must make it possible if you are to survive and thrive in the often near impossible job of being a caregiver.

WHAT'S HOLDING YOU BACK? CLICK IT OR TICKET

For a third consecutive year, the Ohio Department of Public Safety, the Ohio State Highway Patrol and the Governor's Highway Safety Office are teaming with local law enforcement, Safe Communities and all emergency responders to increase seat belt use.

This year during the campaign period, law enforcement will adopt a zero tolerance policy to those not buckling up. Tickets will be issued to those found in violation of Ohio state law. Officers warn drivers to "click it" or expect a "ticket." The "Click It or Ticket" campaign is a national movement coordinated by the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA). It is being incorporated with Ohio's **What's Holding You Back**? Campaign.

The campaign encourages Ohioans to buckle up every trip, every time or face the financial consequences of a ticket.

An observational survey conducted by the Governor's Highway Safety Office showed the campaign was successful in raising seat belt usage statewide. Ohio's usage rate reached an all time high of 74.7 percent. Campaign partners hope to continue this trend with increased belt usage statewide.

Our goal is to increase seat belt usage and to save lives. According to NHTSA, raising seat belt usage rates by 5 percent would save 40 lives every year. Raising the rate by 10 percent would save 82 lives.

Last year, more than half of all Ohioans who died on our roadways in motor vehicle crashes were unbuckled. While a seat belt may not have prevented all of these deaths, experts predict it would have saved many.

One person dies in a fatal crash every 13 minutes; 114 people die every day; 40,000 people die every year.

In a 23-year span, NHTSA estimated seat belts saved the lives of more than 100,000 people. That's more than the entire population of Youngstown, Ohio and equals the population of Marion, Athens and Massillon, combined.

You can't put a price tag on the real losses though: the loss of someone's mom, someone's dad, or someone's child.

Seventy-five percent of all serious motor vehicle accidents occur within 25 miles of a person's home. With those odds, you have a better chance of having a crash during a quick trip to the grocery store for a gallon of milk.

But roads and drivers are unpredictable. If you knew you were going to be in a crash on a certain day, at a certain time, you would, without a doubt, buckle your belt. Don't make excuses.

Our mission is to save lives. That's why, starting May 24 through June 6, local law enforcement will be closely watching Ohio roads and highways for violators of Ohio's seat belt and child passenger laws. Wearing a seat belt and insisting that those who travel with you buckle up is the easiest thing you can do to protect yourself, your friends, and your family.

Beg, plead, even get mad, Do whatever it takes to change the deadly bad habit of not buckling up every trip, every time. Click it or ticket, what's holding you back?
