
I hope you are staying busy - both mentally by reading or interacting with family and friends and physically with simple, safe exercises and stretches!

MEALS ON WHEELS PROGRAM

We have been utilizing Lori's Custom Catering for our Meals on Wheels program for at least two years. We also often have Lori cook the meals at our senior socials especially at our Thanksgiving and Christmas holiday lunches and at our annual May Senior Recognition luncheon. They're delicious!

This lunch time meal is delivered daily Monday through Friday between 11:00 a.m. and Noon by our dedicated team of drivers. The meal will be left in a cooler you provide. This is especially important as the weather gets warmer. The cost of each meal is \$5. If you show current year proof of participation in the HEAP program, your cost will be \$3 per meal. Payment for the meal should be left in your cooler weekly to avoid person-to-person contact.

To sign up please call us for an application or print one from the village website and mail it to us. We will begin your meal delivery on the next Monday after receiving the application.

I encourage you to take advantage of this program as it can help you to eat well, limit the need to leave the house and purchase groceries less often. The food is great too!

MEDICARE-AUTHORIZATION TO DISCLOSE INFORMATION

It may be beneficial to allow someone to have access to your medical information. For instance, there may be times when you are unable to manage your own medical affairs due to health issues. This may be a temporary situation, such as after medical procedure, or a more permanent one, as when dementia develops.

However, Medicare can't just give your personal health information to anyone. There are very stringent federal privacy regulations (often referred to as HIPPA) by which Medicare must abide. By law, Medicare must have your written permission (an "authorization") to use or give out your personal medical information for any purpose that isn't set out in the privacy notice contained in the Medicare & You Handbook. You may take back ("revoke") your written permission at any time, except if Medicare has already acted based on your permission.

If you want to have someone act on your behalf with medical matters, in the future, then you must act now. You need to authorize a person to have this legal ability to act on your behalf with Medicare. There are 2 ways to give permission:

(1) Print and fill out form <u>CMS-10106: "Authorization to Disclose Personal Health Information"</u>. It can be found at: https://www.cms.gov/Medicare/CMS-Forms/CMS-Forms/CMS-Forms-Items/CMS1193148.

Once this form is completed, make a copy for yourself & mail original to: Medicare BCC, Written Authorization Dept. PO Box 1270 Lawrence, KS 66044


(2) Login to your Medicare account, at Medicare.gov, to fill this form out and submit online.

Don't have a Medicare account? Creating an account is easy and gives you electronic access to your health information. Go to medicare.gov. Select "Create account." Follow instructions and submit. You can get additional information by calling (800) MEDICARE Customer Service Representative.


You have the right to take back ("revoke") your authorization. To revoke authorization, send a written request to: Medicare BCC, Written Authorization Dept. PO Box 1270 Lawrence, KS 66044.

Tip: A Durable Power of Attorney Form can work in place of an Authorization to Disclose Personal Health Information Form. That means you don't have to fill out this form, as having a Durable Power of Attorney, covers medical care matters.



What would you pay for a COVID vaccine? Scammers are betting it's a lot Some only lose money, but you could potentially lose much more.

The next group for vaccinations will open up next week, but since supplies are limited, some folks might be tempted to look for other ways to get the shot. Just remember, scammers know this too, and with so many desperate to get vaccinated, thieves have begun texting, emailing, and even calling pretending to help.

"These are the bad guys posing as someone, usually a government agency, although sometimes they have posed as the vaccine makers themselves, trying to trick consumers to give either money or to give sensitive information," Jon Steiger from the Federal Trade Commission told 3News.

They'll claim to get you on the short list for the shot, offer the vaccine if you take part in a clinical trial, or just sell a fake one outright. European law enforcers found an online ad selling a fake Pfizer vaccine for 06882 Bitcoin, or about \$1,300.

The best case scenario is you'll lose some money, but Archer News Network cyber security and tech journalist Kerry Tomlinson says it could be much worse.

"[Let's say] the liquid they give you doesn't work," she explained. "You think you're protected, [then] you get exposed to the virus. You end up with nothing, or they give you a liquid that is harmful, can make you sick or even kill you." But even mistakes by government officials are setting people up to get scammed. People like Pat Dimitroff, who tried to get through on the vaccine reservation line set up by her county in Florida. "I kept hitting redial," she explained. "Redial on one. I get a busy, redial on the other." After 40 attempts, she finally got through, but instead of getting a spot in line, she says, "The call is answered by someone that tells me I could get a \$100 gift certificate from Walmart if I give them my credit card, and they charge \$5 for delivery."

Turns out, the County outsourced the calls, and it seems a rogue employee was running the scam. Then there's what happened last month, when a link from Cuyahoga County was shared on social media, letting people who weren't eligible sign up for the vaccine. It wasn't a scam, and the appointments just had to be cancelled.

But how do you know what's for real? The Better Business Bureau gives the following advice: Fact check any information you receive with the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention and the Food and Drug Administration.

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- Speak with your doctor if you're looking to get the vaccine.
- Make sure that any email purporting to be official ends with ".gov"
- Make sure the URL of any email you respond to begins in "https"
- Look for typos in communications, which is often a tell-tale sign

"You're not going to have to pay in order to get a spot to get your vaccine," Steiger adds. "You're not going to have to pay to get on any sort of list. If they ask for your Social Security number, that's a scam." And seniors: You certainly don't have to pay for the vaccine. Medicare and Medicaid are covering the costs. If someone contacts you claiming to be with them, don't give out any information.
