INVEST IN HOME SECURITY : SAFETY TIPS

Check the Doors

Locks aren't as effective if they're on flimsy doors.

- Make sure all exterior doors & frames are solid wood or metal.
- Doors should fit tightly in their frames, with hinge pins on the inside.
- Install a peephole or wide-angle viewer in all entry doors, so you can see who is outside without opening the door. Door chains are not a security device—they break easily & won't keep out an intruder.

Check the Outside

To discourage burglars from selecting your home as their target of opportunity, make sure to

- Prune back shrubbery that hides doors or windows. Cut back tree limbs that could help a thief climb into windows.
- Light porches, entrances, & yards - front & back. Consider timers that turn on outside lights or install motion detectors.
- Keep your yard well-maintained. Store ladders & tools inside your locked garage, basement, or storage shed when you're not using them
- Clearly display your house number so police & other emergency vehicles can find your home quickly.
- Put lights & a radio on timers to create the illusion that someone is at home when you go away. Leave shades, blinds, & curtains in normal positions. Stop the mail, newspapers, or ask a neighbor to take them in.
- Update your home inventory, listing things like electronic & sports equipment & computers.

What about alarms?

If you have valuables in your home, or live in an isolated area or a neighborhood vulnerable to break-ins, consider an alarm system.

- Before you invest in alarms, check with several companies & decide what type & level of security fits your needs & available resources.

Burglars can take more than your property

Burglars generally don't want to run into their victims. But if they're surprised by someone coming home or pick a home that's occupied, someone may get hurt.

- If you see a screen slit, a window broken, or a door ajar, don't go in. Call the police from a neighbor's house or a public phone.
- If you hear a noise in the night that sounds like someone breaking in or moving around, call the police & wait for them to come. If you can leave safely, do so. Otherwise lock yourself in a room or, if the intruder is in the room, pretend to be asleep.
- Think carefully before buying a firearm for protection. Guns can be stolen. If you do own a gun, lock it up & learn how to use it safely.

If you're locked out of your home, can you still get in? . . . Through an unlocked window in the back, or using an extra key hidden under a flowerpot or up on a ledge? If you can break in, so can a burglar.

A small investment of time & money can make your home more secure & can reduce your chances of being a victim of burglary, assault, or vandalism.

Get to know your neighbors. Watchful neighbors who look out for you as well as themselves are a front line defense against crime.

Check the Locks

In almost half of all residential burglaries, thieves walk in through an unlocked door or crawl through an unlocked window.

- Make sure every external door has a least a 1" bolt & can provide protection against picking, drilling, & other forms of physical attack.
- Secure sliding glass doors with commercially available locks or with a broomstick or wooden dowel in the track to jam the door against intruders,. Insert a pin in a hole drilled in the sliding door frame that goes through the fixed frame to prevent anyone from lifting the door off its track.
- Secure double-hung windows by sliding a bolt or nail through a hole drilled in a downward angle in each top corner of the inside sash & part way through the outside sash. Secure basement windows as well.
- Don't hide keys in mailboxes, planters, or under doormats. Give an extra key to a neighbor you can trust.

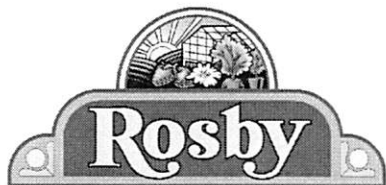

SAFETY TIPS FROM LAW ENFORCEMENT PROFESSIONALS

Take a moment to look this over & then sit down with your child & go over each point, answering questions & encouraging conversation as you go. This may be the most valuable ten to fifteen minutes you will ever spend with your child.

WHAT EVERY CHILD SHOULD KNOW AND UNDERSTAND...

- Children should know their full name, telephone number & full address, including the state they live in.
- Teach them how to make emergency (911) calls & let them know what to expect when they call.
- They should know to kick & scream if any stranger attempts to grab them.
- They should know to never go anywhere with strangers. A stranger is anyone you don't know well. Set up a code word system with them, & tell them not to go anywhere with anyone who does not have the code word.
- They should stay away from parked cars, alleys & dark doorways & should know to always stay in plain view in crowds of people.
- They should never allow older strangers to play in their games
- Tell them to always attend school extracurricular activities in groups.
- Children should never allow strangers to take pictures of them or their friends. Tell them to run away & tell an adult if someone does.
- Children should never ride their bike alone or at night.
- Children should always answer the phone when they are home alone. They should tell the caller that their parents are busy & can't come to the phone & take a message. Practice this with them but they should never answer the door when they are alone & never allow Strangers into the home.

VILLAGE FOOD PANTRY - NEWLY UPDATED INCOME LEVELS

The Village maintains a food pantry for any resident who may need assistance, whether it be temporary or on-going. The pantry contains poultry, meat, dairy items, canned goods, paper products, and personal hygiene items. It is run as a "client choice" pantry meaning that you shop for what your family needs versus receiving pre-packed bags. The pantry is located in its own room, in the service garage, next to the Community Services office.

We contract with the Cleveland Food Bank and receive much of our food free or at a minimal cost through this agreement. In addition, generous donations are received from residents, local businesses and the Women's and Men's Service Clubs.

The food pantry is available to those who meet these eligibility requirements: \$24,279 for a one-person household; \$32,919 for a two-person household; \$41,559 for a three-person household. The amount increases by \$8,640 for each additional household member.

If you feel you may qualify, please call our office and set up a time to shop the pantry. There is no charge and all information is kept strictly confidential.

STEALING FROM ELDERLY- INTERNET SCAM

This is a follow-up on information shared from the Better Business Bureau last month. In the era of increasing technology, more is not always better. As our personal information gets shared and is more readily available, the risk of being scammed grows significantly as well. That is why it is critical to be educated about potential scams and how to best deal with them.




Online purchase scams are now the riskiest form of consumer fraud, according to a new report from the Better Business Bureau. In 2017, consumers reported more than 47,000 scams to BBB Scam Tracker.

Earlier this year Ohio Attorney General Mike DeWine announced that a Pennsylvania man, Ryan Smith, had been sentenced to 30 months in prison for stealing \$17,000 from an elderly Ross County man in an internet scam. Smith posted an ad on eBay offering a Caterpillar backhoe for sale. The Ohio senior contacted him expressing interest in buying the backhoe. Eventually, Smith offered the man a lower price if they went outside eBay to complete the sale. The man wired him \$17,000, but Smith never delivered the backhoe.

To avoid being caught in an internet scam, BBB suggest these tips:





- ◇ **Be aware that even if you are able to cash a check or see funds recorded in your account statement, it may still be a fake.** Your bank may even tell you a check has "cleared," but that doesn't necessarily mean you are in the clear-it can take several weeks to find out that a check has bounced.
- ◇ **Shop with a credit card.** In case of a fraudulent transaction, a credit card provides additional protections; it's easier to dispute charges that you didn't approve. Debit cards, prepaid cards or gift cards don't have the same protections as a credit card.
- ◇ **When buying or selling on a site that offers protections to buyers and sellers, take advantage of them.** If a buyer or seller tries to persuade you to go outside the site's usual process or payment methods, that's a big red flag.
- ◇ **Keep documentation of your order.** Save a copy of the confirmation page or email confirmation until you receive the item and are satisfied. Be sure to know and understand the return policy and keep this documented with your purchase records.
- ◇ **Beware of too-good-to-be-true deals.** Offers on websites and in unsolicited emails may offer free or very low prices on hard-to-find items. There may be hidden costs or your purchase may sign you up for a monthly charge. Look for and read the fine print.

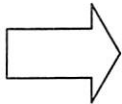
VILLAGE OF BROOKLYN HEIGHTS IS SPONSORING A FREE PAPER SHREDDING DAY

TRASH COLLECTION IN BROOKLYN HEIGHTS

Recycling and trash collection is handled by Kimble Companies, Inc.

Residents are to have their trash and recycling on the curb by 7:00 am on Friday morning.

Please Note: Waste containers and trash can be put out AFTER 3:00 p.m. the day prior to trash collection. Waste containers cannot be left out past 9:00 p.m. the night of trash collection. Ordinances Regarding Waste Containers click [HERE](#)

Tree, brush trimmings and carpet must be tied not exceeding 4' in length or 50 pounds per bundle. Bulk waste, such as stoves, hot water tanks (water removed), washers, dryers, furniture, chairs and carpet (4 feet in length) is also collected on regular trash collection days.

MATTRESS DISPOSAL INFORMATION:

Due to the possibility of bed bugs, mattresses and box springs must be placed in mattress bags for disposal. If not bagged, the mattress will not be picked up by either Kimble or the Brooklyn Heights Service Department.

CURBSIDE RECYCLING IN BROOKLYN HEIGHTS

Kimble Co. provides weekly curbside recycling for village residents. Combine cans, cartons, glass, paper and boxes plus plastic bottles and jugs loose (unbagged) in the provided green 65-gallon cart. Large cardboard boxes should be placed next to the bin.

KIMBLE'S customer service number is (800) 201-0005 if you need to contact them.

Combine these items in your curbside recycling:

CANS: Includes all metal food and beverage cans such as pop, beer, soup, vegetable, and tuna. Cans should be emptied, rinsed, and then recycled.

CARTONS: Includes milk, juice, soup and broth plus wine cartons. Cartons should be emptied and rinsed. Replace the cap and place in your curbside recycling.

GLASS: Includes glass food and beverage bottles and jars. Empty, rinse and replace the lid before recycling. You do not need to remove the label.

PAPER & BOXES: All paper and boxes can be recycled, including newspapers, magazines, junk mail, boxes, greeting cards, cereal boxes, cardboard, phone books and clean pizza boxes. Flatten cardboard items, like cereal boxes, to save space.

PLASTIC BOTTLES: Any plastic bottle, jar, jug or tub can be placed in your curbside recycling. Recycle plastic food and beverage bottles, cosmetics and personal products, and laundry detergent and bleach bottles. Containers should be emptied and rinsed. Replace the cap and put in your curbside recycling. Not all plastics with the 1-7 symbol are recyclable.

OTHER RECYCLING IN BROOKLYN HEIGHTS

Computer Recycling

Computers and components may be dropped off at the Service Garage Monday thru Friday from 7 am to 3 pm. We can give you a receipt but we do not put a value on the equipment. Acceptable home computer equipment includes CPU's, monitors, keyboards, mice, printers, terminals, modems, cables, software and ink printer cartridges. The computer equipment is delivered to non-profit RET3 Job Corp. They are then purged and used for parts to make computers for schools, learning centers, church groups and non-profit organizations. The donation is TAX DEDUCTIBLE.

IMPORTANT CHANGES TO HOUSEHOLD HAZARDOUS WASTE PROGRAM

Please be advised of the following changes to the Household Hazardous Waste Program that will be effective June 2, 2017. We are implementing these changes to reduce program costs for items where alternative disposal options exist.

Fluorescent Bulb Recycling

Fluorescent tube bulbs and compact fluorescent bulbs (CFLs) are no longer be accepted by the service department. Residents can recycle CFL bulbs (small, twisty bulbs) for free at any Home Depot or Lowe's store. Other types of bulbs, fluorescent tubes, can be recycled at any Batteries+Bulbs retail location. Battery Recycling

A Day at the Beach

From fishing and swimming to boating and birding, Northeast Ohioans enjoy spending time on the water. And we're not alone - Lake Erie tourism in Ohio generates nearly \$13 billion in revenue annually. But a day at the beach and the nearshore habitat that fish, birds and other wildlife depend on can be easily ruined by ignorance and carelessness.

Do your part to care for Lake Erie and our local waterways by following these
Guidelines for Responsible Recreation:

Fishing

- Collect all used fishing line and recycle it - look for a container like the one pictured to the right. At the very least, collect your used line and any other line you may encounter and dispose of it in a trash can.
- Use only lead-free sinkers and other fishing products.
- Don't release live bait into the water or at the shore - they may be nuisance species or even invasive.
- Follow local catch-and-release and bag limit regulations to ensure a sustainable fishery.



Boating

- Keep your engine clean and in proper working order to minimize oil and gas leaks.
- Clean with a sponge and plain water whenever possible. When you must use soap, use as little as possible and make sure it is non-toxic, biodegradable and phosphate-free.
- Prevent the spread of invasive species by practicing the Clean, Drain, Dry method on all equipment.
- Take the Ohio Sea Grant Clean Boater Pledge at watercraft.ohiodnr.gov/cleanboating.

Beachgoing

- Pack your trash out or make sure it gets in a trash can. Litter left carelessly on the beach ensnares wildlife and adds to the growing plastic pollution problem in Lake Erie. Plastic six-pack rings, fishing line and balloons are especially dangerous for wildlife.
- Don't dispose of cigarette butts or cigar tips on the ground - they are toxic to wildlife, which often mistakes them for food.
