OBITUARY

Glenn Cook 88, of Brooklyn Hts., went home to be with His Savior and Lord on September 10, 2018. He was born on April 7, 1930 in Cleveland, Ohio to Arthur and Mary (Kanyuck) Cook. He graduated from Cuyahoga Heights High School in 1948. He was owner and operator of Glenn Cook and Sons Greenhouse in Brooklyn Heights. He was a Fireman for the Village of Brooklyn Heights from 1956 to 1965. He then served as a councilman for the Village of Brooklyn Heights from 1966 to 1969 before being reappointed as a Fireman for the Village of Brooklyn Heights in 1970 to 1978 at which time he was promoted to Assistant Fire Chief. In 1980 he was promoted to Fire Chief and served in that position until 1998 at which time he retired from the Fire Department. In all, Glenn dedicated himself in service to his fellow neighbors and citizens of Brooklyn Heights for 42 years. He also drove a school bus for Cuyahoga Heights Schools from 1985 through 2008. At one time, he coached Village baseball and was a Boy Scout Leader. Glenn loved to spend time gardening, and watching his favorite sports teams on television (Indians, Browns, Cavaliers, Buckeyes). Glenn is survived by Doreen, his wife of 70 years, sons Ken (Susan), Randy (Kathy), Larry (Penny), Gordon (Cuba), daughter Cyndi (Jeff) Boyer, 12 Grandchildren, and 3 Great Grandchildren with 1 more, due in October. He was preceded in death by his parents. Glenn was a gentle, humble man loved and respected by those who knew him. He will be dearly missed as a loving husband, father, grandfather and great-grandfather, as well as a public servant, role-model and encourager to many.

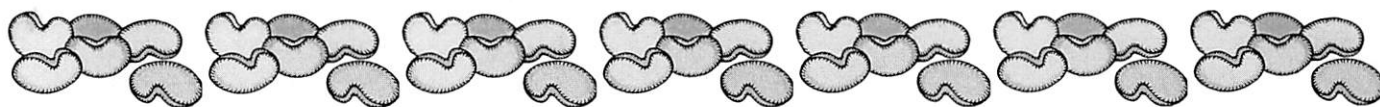

DEPRESSION: HOW TO HELP

Previously we discussed what depression is. The focus this month is how you can help an individual with depression.

What can you do to help? As a caregiver, if you observe the signs of depression for a period of a few weeks or more, discuss your concerns with your older relative in an encouraging and supportive manner. Urge them to make an appointment to see their doctor, to rule out or identify physical causes like health problems or medications. If the doctor's efforts do not resolve the symptoms, seek treatment from a mental health professional. The doctor may make a referral to a therapist, mental health treatment center or geriatric assessment program. Remember: depression is a treatable illness. Most older adults respond well to mental health interventions. Once under treatment for depression, it is important for the person to follow their treatment regime.

As a caregiver, you must understand that just thinking about the things to do to feel better, like going for a walk or spending time with friends, can be exhausting for the person battling depression. You should encourage your family member to start small and stay focused. The key to depression recovery is to start with a few small goals and slowly build from there. Draw upon whatever resources are available. Take things one day at a time and reward each accomplishment. The steps may seem small, but they'll quickly add up.

And for all the energy put into depression recovery, your loved one will get back that much more in return. When you're depressed, just getting out of bed can seem like a daunting task, let alone exercising. But exercise is a powerful tool for dealing with depression. Evidence suggests that physical activity triggers new cell growth in the brain, increases mood-enhancing neurotransmitters and endorphins, reduces stress, and relieves muscle tension—all things that can have a positive effect on depression. Even very small activities that get one's arms and legs moving can add up over the course of a day. The key is to pick an activity the person enjoys, so it will be easier for them to stick with it.

As a caregiver, you should take all comments seriously. If a person is talking about suicide, immediate action is necessary. First, remove access to items that might be used in a suicide attempt such as guns or medications. Then, you will need to take the person to a hospital emergency room for evaluation. Other actions that should serve as warning signs include excessive hoarding of medications like sleeping aids and pain killers. This could be a sign that a person is collecting enough pills to make a suicide attempt.

Help Is A Phone Call Away! If your relative is experiencing a mental health crisis, you may call Cuyahoga County Suicide Prevention Hotline at (216) 623-6888. This 24-hour service is staffed with mental health experts who can talk with you and your older relative about how to stay safe and get help.

ELIGIBILITY

- You must be age 65 or older with no other household member under the age of 65, or
- You are disabled with no other household member under the age of 65. A current letter from your doctor, on their letterhead, explaining your disability must be submitted with your application.

COST

- There will be a charge of \$150 per senior household, for the service. A check, payable to Village of Brooklyn Heights, or exact cash will be accepted (we do not have the ability to give change).
- There will be a discount for any senior that has been approved for the 2018-19 Federal HEAP program. Proof of participation in the HEAP program must be submitted in the form of your current year acceptance letter and/or a copy of a current gas bill with the HEAP discount listed. The cost will be \$60. The discount will be applied once your HEAP acceptance letter is received.

IMPORTANT NOTES

- This service should be supplemental to a service you employ if you need to be out of your drive at a certain time.
- This is a basic snow plowing service. In severe weather conditions, plowing may be delayed.

OUTLINE

- Your street address must be visible from the street.
- If a car is in your driveway while plowing occurs, this will limit the area which will be plowed.
- The driveways are plowed in an assigned order. If the house around the corner is plowed before yours, please be sure that your street will be done in a timely manner. If you have a corner lot, your drive will be plowed by the truck handling your street address.
- If your sidewalk or the street is plowed by the Village after the subcontractor has plowed your drive, we cannot get back out and re-do all of the drives.
- If your drive has been cleared by someone else before the contractor has been there, the contractor will skip your house as it “appears to have been cleared”.
- If your drive is missed or there are any problems, please call the Community Service office - on the day of the occurrence. All calls should be made to 739-3702. Messages will be returned as soon as possible. Please do not call the sub-contractor or the Service Department.
- If any damage occurs please notify the Community Service Department immediately. Any damage to lawns and/or sprinkler systems, etc. must be reported to the Community Services Department no later than May 17, 2019. No reports will be honored after this date.

THE NOVEMBER 6, 2018 GENERAL ELECTION

Voters have many important decisions to make in the November 6th General Election. There are federal, state, county and judicial candidates on the ballot. There will also be state and local issues to be decided by voters.

The Board advises people to be prepared to vote by taking a few simple steps: check their registration status and then select their voting method.

Voters should check their voting information to make sure they are registered at their current address. The deadline to register and/or update voter registrations is on or before Tuesday, October 9th, at 9:00 p.m. Voter registration is now available online at www.443vote.com. Registration cards are available at all public libraries.

Early voting is available from October 10th through November 5th at the Board of Elections located at 2925 Euclid Avenue, Cleveland. Early voting hours are posted on the Board's website.

Voters may also submit vote by mail ballot applications if they wish to vote from home. To request an application visit: www.443vote.com, or call 216-443-VOTE (8683). Vote by Mail ballot applications are also available at all public libraries.

If voters plan to cast a ballot on Election Day they need to bring identification and they may confirm their polling location online. The polls are open from 6:30 a.m. to 7:30 p.m.

The Board is seeking thousands of poll workers to assist voters on Election Day. Poll workers are paid up to \$200.00 and may apply online or by calling the Election Officials Department at 216-443-3277.

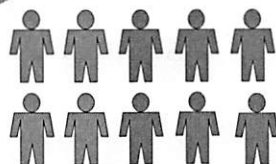




